

What Do I Get...

Members receive a copy of *Ars Quatuor Coronatorum* (AQC), the *Transactions* of Quatuor Coronati Lodge. The book is produced towards the end of each calendar year and mailed out in December or January to all members current as of the prior 30th November. AQC provides the full text of all papers delivered during the year and the questions and answers that followed; the volume contains book reviews, 'notes and queries', and shorter articles of Masonic interest. It is regarded as the Masonic research bible.

Members also receive priority booking and discounted entry to conferences and symposia, and enjoy discounts on non-QC regalia and books from our partner suppliers. They have access to our Research Services and can request copies of past papers from in-copyright volumes of AQC for personal research.

Members receive regular reminders of our meetings and other events, and can access delivery papers online. Members of lodges in constitutions recognised by UGLE are welcome to attend QC Lodge meetings and encouraged to meet the speaker and Lodge members. All members are encouraged to wear the QCCC breast jewel, tie and lapel pin, all of which are approved for use in Lodges.

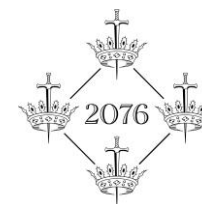
What does it cost...

QC Correspondence Circle

Quatuor Coronati is the world's premier Masonic research lodge. Established in 1884 and consecrated in 1886, the Lodge adopted an evidence-based approach to Masonic history that replaced the imaginative writings of earlier authors; it became known as the 'authentic school' of Masonic research.

QC Lodge shares its research and encourages scholarship via the QC Correspondence Circle – QCCC – the world's first and oldest Masonic research society established almost 140 years ago. Wherever you are, from the Americas to Europe, India, Asia, Australia & New Zealand, or the rest of the world, we would be delighted if you were to join us as a member of QCCC.

We are an international community and QCCC is open to everyone.

QC Regalia

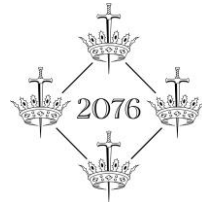
Members of QCCC, whether a Grand Officer or an Entered Apprentice, are entitled to wear regalia specific to QCCC and QC Lodge.

QC lapel pins, ties, and our wonderful enamelled breast jewels are all available for purchase. The jewels are highly recommended and may well become collectors' items, as have earlier versions.



A light blue ribbon is for members of QCCC. That with a dark blue ribbon is for members of the Circle who are Local Secretaries or past Local Secretaries. A red ribbon recognises full members of QC Lodge and Honorary Members of the Lodge.

Breast jewels and ties can be worn at any Lodge meeting, not just that of QC Lodge. Members of QCCC may wear pins and cufflinks of any colour.



Lodge Meetings

Quatuor Coronati Lodge meets five times a year on the second Thursday in November (Installation); third Thursday in February; second Thursday in May; fourth Thursday in June; and second Thursday in September.

Lodge meetings are usually held at Freemasons' Hall, Great Queen Street, London, and open at 4.00pm.

Members of QCCC who are members of lodges in jurisdictions recognized by UGLE are encouraged to attend our meetings and to get to know the members of the Lodge.



International Events

QCCC holds regular conferences and seminars outside of the UK, and members of QC Lodge give talks and lead seminars both nationally and internationally.



A number of Lodge members have been Prestonian Lecturers, the only lecture given under the authority of the United Grand Lodge of England, and all have a broad range of talks, interests and expertise.
